

Flying Fast-the VP's news

There's always a time to move on for most things in life – and for me, that means ending my term as one of the editors of "Servo Chatter", the club's newsletter. For the past 6 years, my brother and I have shared



the duties of the club's newsletter, creating the newsletter on a bimonthly basis. This issue marks the 30th one created since we took over the newsletter duties in 1996 and the binder of issues we have amounts to a large book! For the most part, Chris and I shared the duties, tossing work back and forth depending on our schedules at the time, but I oversaw the production, printing, and saw to it that we met schedules. As of this issue, Chris will retain all duties for the newsletter, cover to cover as I have taken on other responsibilities within the club. Please give Chris your full support – he's an advertising major in college and should polish the newsletter in many ways all while adding his own unique touches. He has also made the majority of the event flyers of the SCCMAS for the past 5 years. I have had fun doing the newsletter and will remember the challenges it brought. It certainly has been a great experience.

In light of giving up the newsletter, I have occupied the position of Vice President for the SCCMAS. As of November I moved to covering other needed areas, such as club cards, electronic database, and the club information phone line. This means that I receive all renewal or new member forms from the treasurer, update the database, and mail out the club cards. One of the things that has been neglected the past few years is the member badges, which so many of you have contacted us about. Within the next few months, I hope to get things settled and in order as renewals taper down so that these badges are made on a regular basis. Please bear with me on these issues as they take time, along with my normal work and college schedule.

Now, onto some exciting news - I'm happy to report that we are well on our way to extending the north end of the runway, repairing the road, and installing the permanent restroom facilities at the field. No dates are set yet, but please be aware that the field will be closed for a week during the runway extension and road repair. There are possibilities that it could happen in the next month, but no guarantees. We will be attempting to provide as much advance notice as possible through email, notices at the field, and a mailing. By adding 125 feet of additional runway on the northern end, the total length of our runway will now be 644 feet! Some other items to be focused on this year include the grass overruns (no more complaining on the north end when the runway is lengthened!), overall grass condition, and fencing along the front of the pits to keep spectators back. With these additional upgrades and field maintenance, work parties will be a necessity and your help is needed to complete the projects. Dates for the work parties will be supplied in advance. Most of this year's improvements are based on club members input from our annual surveys. The results of our yearly survey will be presented at the next meeting.

Remember, if you do not have a set of wings on the back of your club card and you believe that you are soloed, please contact Jim Patrick at 408-356-0817 to schedule a "check out". I'm in the process of going through the last 4 years of paperwork (no easy task) to ensure that our electronic database correlates with what's on paper. I've found some "lost papers" which indicated solos and the database did not. Any errors will be corrected as they arise.

As I write this, our club's weather machine is at the factory being repaired. The temperature sensor has not been acting correctly for some time and it should be reinstalled by the time that you read this. Our phone line for the weather station was also acting funny, so a call to GTE fixed that problem. This line traditionally had a greeting message that gave dates and notices for upcoming events. This will start to be used again as soon as it is reinstalled. For those who don't remember, the number is 408-776-0101. It is listed, along with all the other necessary numbers on the last page of the newsletter.

Airshow 2001 is right around the corner, scheduled for July 14th and 15th. This is our annual two-day event to showcase the R/C hobby to the public. If you are interested in flying or displaying an aircraft in this event, please contact me at (408) 292-1212. I need some volunteers to help with advertising, distributing flyers, public relations, parking, and many other functions for the event. Any and all help will be appreciated. I will be having a meeting with those who volunteer or help in April, so give me a call if you wish to be a part of the event.

Our Inter-club fun fly on March 3rd was a light turnout with 18 participants, 4 of them from other clubs. The weather scared off a few, but all in all, members and guests had a great time at the event. 1st place went to Mike Lobosco, 2nd Bob Ortman, 3rd Kevin Murphy, 4th Larry Arcadi, and 5th Robert book. Best club overall went to the SCCMAS by about 1.5 points over the Livermore Flying Electrons. Also representing the SACRC club was Robert Hixson. Incidentally, SACRC has acquired a new field which is being prepared for flying right now. I believe they have some photos of their new field at http://SACRC.bizland.com.

Kevin Norred has set up a wizz-bang set of events for this year. Be sure to take a look at the 2001 NCRCS event schedule included in this newsletter and Kevin's contest corner. April starts off the T-34 series of races. Ask Kevin, myself, or anyone else at the field, but the popularity of the T-34 races have far succeeded any expectations that were had. Five races for this season with a two-day event for the finals! A club in Reno, Nevada is also hosting their own series. Amazing! May will showcase turbines, turbines, and more turbines as we blast off with a two-day jet rally. Also, please take note of the event schedule in this newsletter. Some renewal letters, included with 2001 club cards, had the Flea Market and Pattern contest reversed for November. Safety/Training by Jim Patrick



I think that it is appropriate at this time to review a few or our club flying rules. Our rules have been developed with regard to safety, courtesy and to provide smooth flight operations.

Because of some recent complaints, I will start out with flying near or over the runway. Our rule states; "When other flyers are present at the flight line, no unannounced high speed passes closer than the far side of the runway edge are allowed." This reduces the chance that a plane making a low pass will hit a plane trying to land. We all want to be able to concentrate on our approach to landing. Announcing your intention to make a low pass is not a guarantee that you have the right of way. It is very likely that not all flyers on the flight line will hear your announcement. Always give right of way to a landing plane.

An experienced pilot does not have much trouble working through the traffic, but we have many new, inexperienced pilots who get disoriented on a crowded day.

Any time that you plan on operating near or on the runway, let others on the flight line know by yelling your intentions. You are trying to let everyone on the flightline know what you intend to do, so yell out loudly. Make others aware you are taking off, landing, making a pass or walking onto the runway to retrieve a plane. There is a simple way to fly in crowded conditions and help avoid accidents between planes. When you go out to fly, bring someone with you to act as a spotter. Many clubs require flying with spotters. You will find out that flying in crowded airspace is much easier with a spotter.

Another rule to remember is; "Start up in the designated pit area. Retain positive control of your aircraft until you pass the first white line of the taxiway before free-taxiing to the runway. No start up on the runway." If you need to start your plane, pull it well off the runway. "Your name, AMA number, and phone numbers are required in all aircraft." f you want your plane returned to you after it is lost, this is necessary. If you want your transmitter returned to you after you leave it at the field, put your name and phone number on it as well. We get one to two transmitters at the field at a time; some left for many months. An unnamed pilot has left his transmitter twice in 6 months., safety is every club member's concern. We have the use of our facility only as long as we act in a safe and responsible manner. If anyone sees an unsafe condition, do something immediately! Don't feel that it is not your responsibility, because it is.



Science Club Presentation

On February 11th, Gary Cervo and Rizwan Hassan gave a presentation on aeronatics and aerial photography to the Saratoga Science Club. The club is composed of fourteen eight grade students who meet every Sunday to explore fun science projects such as rockets, video production programming and wireless communication.

Gary discussed aircraft construction, control surface operation, and center of gravity location. Rizwan pre sented a twenty minutre colored aerial video taken at the club field with his aircraft and camera system. He also discussed installation of the system in his aircraft.

The science club also builds CanSat telemetry modules which are launched in rockets once a year at the Black Rock Desert in Nevada. This is done in conjuction a High Power with Rocket Club whose vehicles reach altitudes of several thou feet. Another club sand project resulted members getting their amateur radio licenses.

24-The three most useless things to a pilot are the altitude above you, the runway behind you, and a tenth of a second.


25-The second most spectacular event is flying your first solo flight. The MOST spectacular event is your first landing.




