As of this writing, we have received much feedback via the surveys included with member renewals and are waiting for the rest to filter in. These surveys guide the direction of the SCCMAS and we look






Having trouble finding a good set of clamps? These little beauties can be found at Orchard (22pcs worth of them) for about \$7.00. They are perfect for hobby use.

## Safety/Training

We have had some beautiful flying days lately. But we have also seen some very ugly days. This is not the season for a lot of flying and training is slow. But if you are a member and need training, call me, I will set you up with an instructor.

I see that some pilots are having

trouble doing approaches during a south wind. If you are having trouble avoiding the wetland area during your approaches, see one of our instructors. We can help you learn a short approach.

When you get your new club card, please check the back of the card to see if it is stamped with wings. This means you are checked off to fly at the field. You do not get this stamp UNTIL you have been checked off. If you do not have the stamp and think you should, call me. I will find out why and get you checked off.

This time of the year we do a lot of building, This is also a good time to do the maintenance on your plane that it surely needs. Because I check them on a regular basis, I still have planes that are years old and have hundreds of flights. One of my planes is on its third battery and second fuel tank. Another is on its third elevator servo, second battery and second fuel tank. I hate fuel tanks. If someone knows how to promise no fuel tank leaks, I want to know.

When you put a new battery into your plane put the date on the pack. Record this information. You can even write it inside the plane. If you can cycle the battery, do this to get its capacity and record this also. When the capacity drops below 80 percent of its original value, get rid of the pack. From my experience, most nicad packs will not last beyond 4 years. Many of us have an ESV with a load. This is not the only way or the best way to check a battery. An ESV does not tell you the capacity of the battery. It tells you that you have charged the pack. You can then cycle the pack if you have the equipment.

Nicads in good condition will maintain a voltage of at least 1.1 volts per cell during long storage. To check this you need a voltmeter WITHOUT a load. You need to check the battery pack voltage with NO load on it. It is good to check a pack that has been sitting around for a few months. If any nicad stored without a load on it drops below 1.1 volts per cell, don't trust it any further, it is most likely going bad. I have found this myself on at least three nicad packs. I then cycled the packs. I found the capacity below 80 percent, in fact 60 to 70 percent. Each of these packs was 4 years old or older. It is a good idea to stop using packs that are over 4 years old. If you just charge a low capacity pack over night then check with an ESV it will look like a good pack. You might only be able to fly a few flights before the pack died. Don't take chances with your batteries. To fly safely, we have to make sure that everything on our planes is operating properly. forward to seeing how the club is doing in the member's eyes. Several items that we have seen trends on are the newsletter and field improvements. On the newsletter, I would like to say that this newsletter is your newsletter, the member. Articles are welcome and encouraged. Chris, being the editor can't do it all himself and he needs help from you, the member, to provide content. Send in those hints and tips, interesting articles, member spotlights, etc. Now, for the field issues...

On Saturday, February 22nd, we will be having a major work party at the SCCMAS field. During this work party, several areas of the field will be worked on and we need the membership's help at this event. All helpers will receive a free lunch and drinks along with getting their names listed in the SCCMAS year-end event helpers drawing for 2003. Specific areas of improvement will be the overall grass condition (overrun & grass runway strip), installation of sprinkler lines to give better coverage, replace & paint the broken wooden posts (RV and south field area), install mesh over last sun shade, touch up paint, slurry seal in necessary areas, and organize the snack shack workshop/storage bin. What is needed from members is shovels, rakes, wheel barrows, and tools to move dirt. We will be attempting to smooth and fill in all of the rough areas around the grass and re-seed necessary areas to give that ultimate grass condition. With your help, this will be possible. Come out and lend a hand.

We are currently working on our event schedule for 2003. As of this writing, it looks like the events held will be as shown below. The events are based on our previous years' events and from information gathered in the event surveys. The idea is to keep our event schedule down to 1 event per month. This year's schedule removes two days from our contests as compared to last year's. The dates will be confirmed on January 26<sup>th</sup> at the NCRCS meeting, which aims to ensure clubs don't have overlapping events. We're still looking for an enthusiastic individual willing to step up and volunteer for the contest coordinator position. Must have an AMA CD license. If not, we will help you get one. The AMA requires 3 years AMA membership before allowing one to posses a CD license. Contact me if interested.

March - Inter-Club Fun Fly April – Flea Market & Warbird or T-34 Race May - Jet Event (2 day) June - Electric Fly-In July – Airshow (2 day) & Flea Market August - Giant Scale September – IMAC (2 day) October – T-34 or Warbird Race November – Pattern (2 day) & Flea Market

The SCCMAS website has seen some major additions over the past few months. This includes the addition of our live weather cam. The weather information updates live from the field every 10 minutes. While the system has been a little rocky, things are starting to stabilize. We're chartering new ground with this system. The server at the field now has its own phone line so that the updates are more frequent (couldn't get DSL or Cable at the field), and the system handles two cameras and the weather station. So far, things appear to be stabilizing and the cameras are fairing pretty well. The

pit cam, which points at the pits, saturates with direct sunlight in the early morning (8 to 9 am), but works at all other times. Weather operates 24-7 and the cameras take pictures during daylight.

All in all, I think we have one of the finest fields in the country.... I'm certainly proud of it and you should be too.

Jo robinson passed away just last month after a long illness of cancer. Jo Robinson was known as the flying lady. She loved to fly and always came to the field with her husband Art.




