

Our New Club Trainer




I am a devotee of Murphy's Laws, which state among other observations that all projects will take twice as long as predicted. My initial commitment to SCCMAS was to have an operable trainer in the clubhouse by Halloween 2004 for the club to use for demonstrations and for backup when the student's plane becomes



inoperable. It actually arrived on New Years Day 2005. The Hanger 9 Alpha Trainer I rebuilt is now the second to undergo the French touch. Its history is identical to the first trainer, which was fished out of the white trash bins that surround the assembly area. We apparently are a "throwaway generation" of R/C enthusiasts. Rather than fixing minor breakage, the prevailing thought is to dispose of the old and always buy the new. In this regard, I am from the Old School. My planes never die; they just get rebuilt ad nauseum.

I am neither an aeronautical engineer nor am I a connoisseur of ARF trainers. But 99% of my flying for the past few years has entailed flying a very wide variety of these planes. As such one gets to know the weak points and features of each. Over time I have accu-

mulated a substantial set of feelings of how to correct weaknesses in a variety of the planes I've flown. The Hanger 9 Alpha Trainer is at the top of my list. I like the Alpha. It is a sleek plane with generally good flying characteristics. But like the rest, it is sold to generate a profit for Hanger 9 and not designed to be even remotely durable, although




it is tougher than some of the others that I have flown. The plane shown is the second Alpha trainer that I have restored for the club's benefit [hence the Number 2 on the tail].




I would like to cover some of the upgrades that were made on the plane with hopes that others student members might adopt similar corrections to improve the durability of their planes. Some of the modifications were made simply to make the plane appear faster and sexier but

do nothing for performance. [Pic 1] The biggest problem with most standard trainers is that the wire landing gears bend flat in time. I have had welded an inverted "V" to the gear [Pic 2] such that the form of the gear will be retained while still giving the gear lateral flexibility. Remember that the attitude of a tricycle gear plane must always be negative on the ground, meaning the nose is slightly tipping down when the plane is at rest. The first thing that plane touches when it is landing is the main gear so that they have to be lower than anything else on the plane.





firewall fits in front of a plywood box that extends back into the rest of the fuselage. The point of this is that the Teflon nose wheel bracket will fail before the firewall and fuselage fails on a severe landing. I want the nose gear to bend or the bracket to break before the fuselage breaks.




whole process in my judgment simpler. Both the receiver and the battery are contained in their own custom designed plywood box with foam padding for protection and red Monocote covering. The main wheels are oversized to 2.75" diameter rather than 2.5" as this aids in

keeping the plane at a slightly negative tile while on the ground. The engine is a standard MECOA 46. It has plenty of power and idles just fine. Because of the additional plywood added to the fuselage, the planes weight is balanced to about 6 lbs 6 oz. empty. The aircraft's battery is 650 mAH so there is not a lot of flight time before recharge - probably around four 15 min. flights. There is a custom made storage rack for the plane which has a timer controlled charger to keep the plane and it's donated Futaba FP-T7UAP PCM1024 Programmable



Transmitter ready to go. The plane is available to any of the club members through an instructor or club administrator with access to the clubhouse storeroom. Bring your own gas, glow plug igniter and engine starter motor! It flies great!

We are looking into having a few new signs made for the field. With this in mind, if there are any signs that that come to mind, that may be helpful or informative please let me know. An example of the signs in the works includes Emergency, Park Ranger Office and Sheriff phone numbers.

I have a few things on my list for the next workday that will need attention soon. One of these is a couple of steps that are starting to loosen up on the shack. Please watch for and remind others of this issue until we get it repaired when the weather allows. Anyone with an ambition to light up a skill saw and drive a few nails is invited to help out.

And finally, a reminder: As of this writing, there is no change in the use of the helipad \ hover area for flying of small foamie electrics. This is a red "No Fly" zone and as such, all fixed wing models of all types, including small electrics, gliders and toy type of craft are to be flown beyond the runway safety net line. There have been a few coffee cup discussions over this issue. But again, as of this writing, there is no change, and the original rules of flight in the park are still in effect. If you have a suggestion of what may be a practical and safe way to accommodate these rapidly appearing models in our facility, please write something up and give it to any club official so we can toss it on the table. Keep in mind that the toughest issue will probably be the definition of "small".

The race season is coming fast, no pun intended, so get your hardhat and your sunscreen ready. Be sure everything is tight and balanced. Lay in a supply of glow plugs and props, get the new batteries cycled and let's go play outside!!!!




