As I sit here gazing out the w i n d o w while writing this

issue's column, rain is coming down pretty good outside. Certainly, California needs the water. Alas, the weather provides for some time inside, of which reflection can be had. I've been pouring over the survey results from last year, along with looking at much of the tasks ahead for the SCCMAS in 2009.

Before I discuss some of the surveys and such, I wanted to mention the next club meeting. On March 25th, well known modeler Kent Nogy will be in town to discuss 2.4GHz technologies with us at the meeting. He'll talk about the systems, how they work, and answer any questions that you may have. Be sure not to miss this event! Guests and visitors are more than welcome, so feel free to invite your friends! Also, as instituted last meeting, we will be having pizza and water available, which was well received. Donations are appreciated to offset the cost of the food. Thanks to Matt Campi for heading this up!

Last issue, I highlighted many of the main themes that came out in the annual surveys. Thank you to all who returned them! Obviously, many would like to see more permanent restrooms, better runway overrun, resealing of runway, etc. On the bathrooms, we have no current guidance on this issue to report. The county delayed some of the discussions for a later date, meanwhile, our research showed that we may only end up with pretty expensive glorified porta potties, due to a leach system being a potential prob-

lem. All the same, the cost of materials has gone up significantly and we have to weigh the cost/benefit of such. With this, we've been looking at typical improvements that need to be made. The asphalt areas need to be re-sealed. This is a pricey endeavor, given the cost of oil and thankfully, it appears that there is some relief coming in the cost of this lately. However, it will still take a chunk out of our everyday bank account. Membership was slightly down last year (it appears due to the economy), so we are also looking at our expenses carefully as there are some areas that we can tighten the belt on. One of the areas is our airshow.

Our annual airshow is coming up fast, and will be held on July 11th and 12th. Some ask why we do this event. Simply put, it is an opportunity for us to open ourselves up to the community and share our hobby with them. This event takes a lot of manpower to put on, and costs us about \$2500 out of pocket (after income/expenses) each year. For 2009, we are looking for more volunteers to help us with this event. Help is needed in many areas. The first week of March we had a kickoff meeting for the airshow, which will continue with monthly status meetings. The airshow simply does not happen. It takes many hundreds of volunteer hours to put on over several months. More details will be included in the next newsletter, in emails, and on the club website regarding the airshow. but we look forward to an increased participation from the membership this year.



Training

Electric and Gas Trainers

Today, the majority of calls I receive regarding flight training start with the premise that the student will be learning to fly on an electric foamy trainer. The low cost easily fixed planes that are being offered, provide a high incentive sex appeal plane to new members of our club. I support their choices for the most part and use their planes if possible. Although I realize that battery operated planes have a place in our future, they, in my judgment, still fall short of the performance needed to recreate the challenges of realistic flight.

The requirements I currently recommend on trainers are twofold. First, the planes must have ailerons and not just rudder and elevator. Secondly, their transmitter must have the provision for a buddy box. Many don't.

I have several criticisms of the electrics that I see and I realize that we are shortchanging our students when flying the foamies.

The first comment is that in comparison to gas power trainers, each flight time of electrics is probably less than half of a gas trainer. Battery exhaustion times of the electric trainers is typically 12 to 15 minutes. Gas planes will usually do twice that. I recommend all the electric flyers posses at least three [expensive] batteries when they come for a training session. Where the recharge time for batteries are in excess of an hour, you can refill the gas tank of your OS Max in a few minutes and be able to fly until you run

your gas supply dry.

Secondly, most of the electric trainers I have flown are underpowered compared to comparable gas trainers. Granted the electric planes are considerably lighter but they are not necessarily more powerful.

The third and probably biggest personal objection I have is that the foam trainers frequently respond in an unrealistic fashion. I have literally rotated an electric trainer about its pitch axis. Flipping the plane is a close description. Interesting but unrealistic.

Lastly, foam trainers are very light. In any wind conditions they can become very difficult to control precisely. They are designed for still air which our field is not noted for.

Where this leads me is that, yes, I will teach anyone if they bring their foamy trainer to the field for initial instruction. I will, however, recommend to them that the experience of a heavier plane more closely replicates actual aircraft performance and that they plan to advance themselves to flying gas until such time as electrics weigh 6 or more pounds and fly more than 15 minutes.

I have included a picture of the same popular ARF trainer offered both as a gas and as an electric. The size and shape are the same. The performance of the gas in my estimate is substantially greater. MF



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


