This month, I would

like to welcome Mike Leggett onto our board of directors, as our new secretary. Mike will be handling our meeting minutes and helping with communication of such. I'd also like to thank Dean Sala, who served as secretary and webmaster for many years. His help was much appreciated!

I'd like to remind everyone about communication on the flight line. This is an important topic. Just saying "landing" does not mean everyone heard you. Please make your intentions heard loudly, use a spotter to help you in these efforts. and acknowledge to others that you heard them. Typical announcements include "on the runway", "landing", "taking off", "off the runway", etc. This is one area where I am getting lots of complaints and it is becoming a major safety issue

At the time of this writing work is underway and the field should have a coat of slurry seal completed by the time you receive this. I want to reiterate that all of us should be helping to keep the asphalt surface clean and free of fuel. Too often, we neglect to capture fuel when it overflows during fueling, or when a tank is full and we tip the nose of our airplane down. Please help to prevent spills so that the slurry seal lasts in he pit area. We have also added some "turn outs" along the main taxiway. These are intended where congestion is on the taxiway in that passing is difficult. Please note: They are NOT for startup or aircraft storage.

With the rainy season almost behind us, new members and visitors will be passing by the field. Remember that we have a family field at the SCCMAS. This means we should watch our language and actions. Small children and their parents will be present. First impressions last a long time. Don't be afraid to welcome the stranger at the field and chat with them about your planes and answer any questions you have. They might just be that next giant scale, pattern, heli or racing pilot. 

Hey Fellow Flyers-

As we start our longer spring and summer flying seasons, ('cause we stopped and are rusty due to inclement weather?) I wanted to dedicate the March safety column to few 'common sense' reminders about safety.

Our beloved Tomcats field incorporates many physical safety areas built into a great layout and design, even the many guests showing up for a 'look-see' notice this as they arrive at the field.

Starting from the parking area, you notice the spectator area/ flight-preparation area (also referred to as the «pits»), Startup areas (beyond the spectator fence), three taxiways, (Alpha to the North by the separate Heli Area, Center Taxi way, Bravo to the south, and finally the 'active' runway.

Our excellent field layout builds in safety, but in addition we each need to have a good, safe attitude to go along with it. I mean all of us. We get there and are excited about flying. But we should slow down, not be hurried and stressed out, tired, distracted, or overconfident when we prepare to fly.

Beginners, new members, really anyone who has not been signed off, will have hooked up with Peter and the training team, and have made arrangements for flight instruction. All this precludes the all important steps of preparing your aircraft for a safe flight, the preflight check of your aircraft, finally getting the engine running, and taxing the aircraft to the active.

Preflight Checklist (From AMA Guidelines)

Mechanical and Visual: The first precheck is mechanical. Thoroughly inspect the exterior of the aircraft; look for loose, damaged, or torn covering or structural damage. Pull-test the wheel collars to make sure they are secure. Ensure that the wheels roll freely. If you find any damage, take the model back to the pits and complete any needed repairs. You will be happier for doing so. Make sure that all bolts and screws—engine bolts, muffler bolts, wheel collars, wing-mounting bolts, screws holding the landing gear, and servo mounting screws—are tight. Torque the propeller nut as tight as you can get it with a 6-inch wrench or one of the four-way wrenches to keep the propeller from spinning off during the starting process.

2 *Control:* Do the controls for the aircraft move easily, without binding? Do they go the correct direction when you move the control stick?

Pay particular attention to the ailerons since they are easily reversed with modern radios. Stand behind the aircraft. If you move the aileron control stick for a right turn, the right aileron should travel in the upward direction and the left aileron should travel in the downward direction.

Pull on the control surfaces to check the hinges' integrity. Sometimes a hinge will break or pull out of the slot where it was glued because of vibration or rough treatment.

3 Battery: Inspecting the battery can be done two ways. You can measure its voltage with a voltmeter that places a load on your receiver's power circuit and confirm that the power indicator on your transmitter registers more than 80%. The other way is to verify that the transmitter *and* receiver batteries are charged for 12 hours the night before you fly. For you electric power flyers, the flight battery needs the same attention and many are charging real time for multiple flights at the field.

4 *Radio:* Item 1 of the AMA Safety Code for RC flight states, "I will have completed a successful radio equipment ground range check before the first flight of a new or repaired model aircraft."

To perform this inspection, have someone watch the aircraft while you stand 30 paces—roughly 100 feet—from it with the transmitter antenna collapsed. Hold the transmitter in a horizontal position with both hands so the control sticks point straight up and the antenna stub is pointing directly at the model. This configuration will give the worst signal reception, which is what you want for this test. Move the controls to activate the servos while your observer verifies their proper operation. The controls should move freely, smoothly, and with no jitter.


Registration fees will be \$20 at the event and \$15 if you pre-register before the event. Pre-registration will be begin March 1st.
